Department Reports

Police and Fire

Our city ordinance states no fireworks are allowed except by permit from the city council; however, the city attorney has determined that we can follow state law which specifically permits non-aerial devices such as sparklers, ground spinners, fountains, smoke devices or snakes.

Specifically prohibited are any fireworks not specifically permitted, such as firecrackers, jumping jacks, or similar products.

In summary, anything which goes up in the air or explodes is prohibited, except by permit from the city.

The state selling period is midnight, June 23 through midnight, July 5. Midnight December 26 through midnight January 1. Additionally, the city does issue some permits during the Pioneer Days time period. Retail sales permits from the city are valid for one year.

The police department will enforce fireworks laws as outlined above, including confiscation of illegal fireworks and the issuing citations.

Mosquito abatement is in progress. It would help if the alleys were cleared of debris, as we are going to try to spray using the alleys. This will take place as the wind permits.


Water, Sewer and Garbage

Dear City Resident

I am excited to tell you about a possible project I feel could be a great asset to our community. I have been working for the past few months on the idea of starting a community-owned store in St. Anthony.

I recently made a trip to Powell, Wyo., to talk to officials there about the store they opened in 2002. They are celebrating the fifth anniversary of The Merc, a community-owned clothing store. Powell has formed a cooperative of similar stores in Wyoming, Montana and Nevada to give them better buying power, and we are welcome to join the group. In Powell, a number of new businesses have opened in the downtown since The Merc was established. Powell has also found The Merc to be a tourist draw and a rallying point for the community.

A group of BYU-Idaho interns is working on a business plan for a store in St. Anthony. They expect to have it complete by July 9, the date of our next town meeting. I will present it to the county commissioners, city officials and community leaders at a meeting July 10. If they support the concept, we can proceed.

The first step is contacting everyone to ask you to attend our town meeting July 9 if you are at all interested in this project. Community-owned stores across the county are having tremendous success. Residents have the opportunity to invest in their own store, and they tend to shop there instead of traveling out of town to buy what they need.

The town meeting will be Monday, July 9, at 7 p.m. at South Fremont High School in St. Anthony.

This project will require a group of dedicated people to serve on the board of directors. If you are interested or if you have someone you would like to recommend, please attend the town meeting.

I am excited about the potential for this project, but its success or failure depends on the community. Be sure to attend July 9 at the high school to express your thoughts.
