Department Reports

Police and Fire

The 30 MPH speed limit on South 3rd East (Teton Highway) has been extended in both directions of travel from 500 North to south of the entrance to the city industrial park.

During the Fisherman's Breakfast there were several instances where pedestrians were crossing the road in a crosswalk, or otherwise at an intersection; a vehicle would stop to allow the pedestrians to cross but a vehicle in the other lane would violate the law by not stopping. The State Code, 49-702. requires: "Pedestrians' right-of-way in crosswalks. -- (4) Whenever any vehicle is stopped at a

marked crosswalk or at an unmarked crosswalk at an intersection [any intersection] to allow a pedestrian to cross the highway [any roadway], the driver of any vehicle approaching from the rear shall not overtake and pass the stopped vehicle." With school out, there will be more pedestrians to look out for, so be safe.

Annual Greenway Clean Up was a Success!!

Thanks to all the helpers during the Annual Henry's Fork Greenway Cleanup Day 2009. It was a very productive group that collected 69 bags of garbage and larger items along both sides of Highway 20 on May 9th. Special thanks go to: Jerry Reese, Rose Lehman, Daniel Hidalgo, and Kara Hill for their efforts. Thanks to Kyle Babbitt for coordinating the event and bringing water and muffins. She also picked up the special Adopt-A-Highway bags, vests, and signs for the event from Idaho Transportation Department. They ran out of bags, and Kyle had to go and buy more to finish the project. Rose went back a few days later, and hammered some nails back down on the bridges.

A huge thanks goes to Arden Stoddard and all the participants from the St. Anthony Idaho Stake. There were over 30 participants who helped with the highway cleanup. Another group of about 15 added gravel to the edge of the first ½ mile of the trail. A special thanks goes to Jim Hobbs, Ron Birch, Dave White, and Dirk Forbush who brought their ATVs and trailers to move the truck load of gravel down the trail. Others loaded and shoveled it on the edges, raked it out, and swept off the asphalt. It was a productive day with still ongoing work to be done to finish the edging.

In addition, other groups got bags from the City and cleaned up four other locations. There was an estimate of 50 people who helped in the other areas. Thanks also to the moms who made lunch in Horsey Park for over 80 volunteers.

All this help equates to 150 volunteer hours along the Greenway with an additional 165 volunteer hours in the other locations. It all helps - Almost 8 weeks of full time work in just one day!!

There is always more to be done. If anyone missed the clean-up day but still wants to help, they can walk the trails and pick up garbage as they go. Donations are always welcome (they are used for matches or to maintain the trail!) And for \$25 or more, you can get a Greenway hat or shirt. Also, making benches or work days of edging gravel on the north and south sides would be great community work projects. If anyone is interested, we can also schedule a smaller cleanup day in the fall to finish off the year. We may be able to continue work on the north side
